CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE BY MICK VINEY

As I write this a few weeks before publication it's difficult to be completely current. "Today" as I write and reflect we are preparing to meet Billingham Sythonia, having beaten the Bay and thrashed Bishop Auckland and we are happily sitting in 4th position in the league. Very happy days indeed.

We have made superb progress under this club committee's stewardship, and under this team's management. There have been, and maybe still are, some dissenting voices, but I believe that the vast majority of Shields supporters would join me in congratulating them on the great work they have done......SO FAR!

These are very good times to be a Shields supporter. Sitting in a fairly lofty position in the league has quite naturally, had some discussing the possibility of progressing up the pyramid. Would we take it if we were to be successful enough to finish high enough? Would we decide like so many before us to remain in our comfort zone, or as big fish in a little pond?. Many have taken this decision, and it's a decision that they are entitled to take as we each have our own reasons and criteria......and of course finances.

I believe that progression is not just a nice option when offered, but is VITAL. To rest on your laurels at any level of sport, or indeed life inevitably leads to decline. Many clubs before us have progressed to a level, and become complacent expecting to remain where they are....only to suffer a further descent back down. We ARE progressing. We ARE growing and now is the time to look at how to continue that journey.

I believe this management team WOULD take promotion if it were offered and IF we could fulfil the eligibility criteria. I have had a look at this criteria and can see that as things stand we simply don't qualify. No matter what happens on the pitch. To progress beyond this level we need at least an additional stand, a separate toilet block and we need ownership of the ground or security of tenure. In short, as we have none of these, what we actually need is a lot of money.

Money is always an issue in any organisation at any level. Some teams have wealthy benefactors that buy success or progression for their clubs. We do not! Nor do we have an additional revenue stream such as a clubhouse. But what we do have is ambition, potential and a largely untapped local community. We supporters need to be the driving force in taking this club back to its own community. We need to get out and spread the word. We need to be talking about OUR club in the pubs in OUR town, in the way people talk about Sunderland and Newcastle, Manchester United and Arsenal. We need to have almost an evangelical approach talk to the unconverted. We need to continue to create interest in OUR club. We need to simply talk to everyone. To create and build interest.

The club for their part need to continue to seek improvement and success on the pitch. If we are currently unable to progress upwards through the pyramid, then we must ensure we gain success in cup competitions and use this revenue to fund our eventual progression. Whitley Bay gained tens of thousands of pounds in their Vase win. That success has boosted their gates by 67% this season, further filling the coffers. That sort of income is exactly what we need to get to the next stage of the South Shields FC evolution and it IS achievable. If we can't be promoted then we have to treat these cup games as vital. This is where the non-attending public will have their interest tweaked. We are doing so well in the league, now we have to match this in the cup competitions.

Between us all, fans, managers and players we can push Shields on. We each have to play our part. We fans need to tell the community about OUR club, create the interest and get people in for the first time.....and the team need to provide the product that makes them want to come back. **ONWARDS and UPWARDS. TOGETHER.**

SUPPORTER'S ASSOCIATION REPORT

This time last year we found ourselves rooted to the foot of the Northern League Division 1 table. We currently occupy 4th spot with a real possibility of a top half finish. For me this represents a real step forward, progress that has been brought about as a result of much hard work from the management team, the club committee and not least of all the supporters. A major contributory factor for our progress is the togetherness demonstrated by the aforementioned. We appear to have everybody singing from the same hymn sheet – maybe on second thoughts almost everybody.

FROM THE CLUB SECRETARY, BY PHIL REAY

The season has certainly been eventful to date with a series of highs and lows, great victories and disappointing defeats, but without doubt a much improved season in comparison to our first in Division 1.

We are now seeing the benefit of the hard work put in during the close season as we have yet to have a game postponed despite having some horrendous weather in recent weeks; of course the hard work put in after each game by Chairman Gary Crutwell and the ever youthful Gerry O'Reilly has also helped as they restore the pitch replacing divots and rolling the pitch to provide a surface fit for the players to play attractive passing football.

We are, at the time of writing, in the middle of a purple patch with 8 consecutive victories which has included some impressive scalps and some fine performances; for me the stand out game was probably the way the lads bounced back from the 6-3 defeat at Whitley Bay to defeat Penrith away 1-0. It has to be said that visits to Penrith always seem to be memorable whether it be for the performance or the social side of the trip or as with this year both.

The disappointing part of the season has been our inability to reproduce our league form in cup games, the defeats against Jarrow Roofing and Ryton were very disappointing, however there may yet be a reprieve in the League Cup as Ryton played an ineligible player and will be removed from the competition, as yet we have not had confirmation of this. It is not the way we would like to progress but we will take it, on a personal note I have to say I feel very sorry for Ryton secretary Ken Rodger who was very upset when he rang me out of courtesy to tell me of the error made by Ryton. Who'd be a secretary?

However whilst cup form could be better we will not win all games and even the best teams have dips in form, Spennymoor Town with all of their money went out of the Durham Challenge to Jarrow Roofing and League Cup at the hands of Bishop Auckland. The squad has seen a few changes during the season as Studs and Justin have made some fine tuning, I think this has been the secret of our success, instead of making wholesale changes they have brought players in to strengthen and improve squad whilst allowing others to leave. Niki Lawson has proven to be a superb acquisition and David Meechan is settling into the squad.

The coverage we are getting in the Gazette continues to be superb, special thanks to Iam Burn for providing the photographs that have illustrated both the Gazette and the match programme. The continued work of the Supporters Association is greatly appreciated by the club as you spread the word around the town hopefully the work will bear fruit in the shape of more members and increased gates on match days.

We all wish that stalwart of the association Geordie Wood a speedy recovery from his recent heart attack and a return to Filtrona Park. In addition we also wish Dick Bailey all the best as he embarks on his treatment to remove the tumour on his vocal cord. We currently sit proudly in 4th position in the League, our highest for quite some time and of course we must be safe from relegation. What a difference a year makes, this time last season we were rooted to the bottom of the table with the prospect of relegation a real threat, at Christmas we had the following record:



Games to be recalled at Simonside Hall

<u>CHARLIE THOMAS, 1908 – 2001.</u>

THE CAREER OF A TRUE FOOTBALLING LEGEND.

A TRIBUTE BY THE EDITOR, BOB WRAY.

Charlie Thomas was a greatly respected name in local football, who went on to an eminent career with the Football Association. This tribute is dedicated to the memory of a quiet, thoughtful gentleman of outstanding talent and ability as a shrewd, astute and resourceful club manager and skilled administrator. He was truly a wonderful servant to our national game, which was indeed his life. Charlie was widely recognised as the north east's senior citizen of the game. His name was a household word in local football circles, and for the game he loved, his life long enthusiasm was undiminished and wholehearted. He was indeed a legend in his own lifetime, and one of nature's gentlemen. By any standards his was a quite remarkable career in both management and administration, and his achievements will not be forgotten by all who knew him. His memory will remain for all who love football in the local fraternity and his work with gratitude and affection.

He was born in Benwell, Newcastle in 1908, and at an early age moved to Ouston. His first team was Birtley St.Joseph's School X1, where he played right half. After school

days he played for Ouston Juniors and later for Ouston United. As a youth of 16 years of age came his first administrative appointment with his local side, where he achieved much success. In those days he earned his living selling insurance, following eight years in the local coal mine, he also sold his garden produce for club funds. He gained a commendable reputation for talent spotting, and his recommendations often guaranteed a professional career. Sunderland AFC got more than their fair share of Charlie's discoveries, the best known being Fred Hall during the late 1940's, via Blackburn Rovers. His father took him to watch Newcastle United as a boy, which was the start of his support for the club. Sir Bobby Robson as a then 15 year old, was known to Charlie and they developed a life long friendship. Charlie was then a scout for Birmingham City, and tried to persuade him to sign for them, but Bobby chose Fulham instead. A career that spanned seven decades took Charlie from inconspicuous surroundings to national level.

During the Second World War he served with the RAF in India, where he attained the rank of Squadron Leader. He was appointed manager of the RAF India Command football team, which was composed mostly of league players, and was also President of the joint committee of the three services, Army, Royal Navy and Royal Air Force.


It is with South Shields Association Football Club that he is best locally remembered, which he managed in three appointments, between 1947-51, 1954 - 63 and 1970 - 74, the latter as assistant manager, then manager and lastly as general manager. The late 1950's and early 1960's was a halcyon period in the club's fortunes, and debatably the most memorable game in the club's postwar career was the magnificent 5 : 0 FA Cup first round replay victory against Fourth Division Crewe Alexandra on Wednesday afternoon of November 19th, 1958 in front of a crowd of 12,000.

The club was later to achieve a record ground attendance of 20,500, and another huge gate was the 19,500 for the FA Cup visit of York City, managed by Shields-born Sam Bartram. These were indeed unforgettable days and due in great measure to the expertise and managerial skills of Charlie. During his working life, his football activities were part-time, from 1945 on his RAF demobilisation he was employed at the Tyne Dock Engineering Company (TDE) ship repair yard in South Shields as industrial relations manager.


He was personally responsible for the acquisition of a complete floodlighting system from Sunderland AFC for Simonside Hall, and many hundreds of British Railways redundant wooden track sleepers with which to form terracing, from the rail salvage depot on Simonside's Newcastle Road, which at that time was located immediately opposite to the Simonside Hall ground. His ultimate ambition was league status again for South Shields, and its home eventually developed to accommodate a capacity of 40,000. Neither were realised, but to his great and lasting credit his service with the Mariners will be always remembered with gratitude and affection. He also scouted for several league clubs, and numerous Shields players enjoyed league careers, including the iconic Chris Marron, free scoring centre forward with the all-time FA Cup 10 goals individual record in a preliminary round tie. Charlie was the recipient of several offers of league club managerial appointments, which were always declined, as he put it, 'to avoid ulcers'.

He was the President of 10 county leagues, and held no less than 27 senior positions, particularly in Durham, and was the proud recipient of an illuminated address presented to him in 1983 on the occasion of his 20 years FA Council membership. During these years he also served on the International Committee and the Senior Committee, and was


an FA Vice President, and accompanied many FA teams abroad, both at junior level and the full international side. Throughout his long career, his involvement in the game was supported totally by his long suffering wife Ellen, who predeceased him, and who was a football widow for many years. His presence and advice was always well remembered by the many who knew him as a good and most knowledgable friend and trusted mentor, and he was always involved and deeply interested in what the FA was doing at grass roots level. Sir Bobby Robson knew Charlie better than most, having been associated with him from his own early days as a junior in County Durham, and through his career to his time as manager of Ipswich and later right up to the top as manager of England, and said that he was " quite simply a real football fanatic, and he served the game in a lifetime of devoted service with distinction and honour. But above all he was a man whose first love was at grass roots level and with the youngsters, and was always involved and interested in what the FA was doing at the foundations and base of football. He was very proud to be a member of the senior committee and was always very supportive of me as the manager of England, I think he liked having a fellow Geordie in charge of the national team ! He was a lovely man who loved football beyond anything, and was a great servant of the game ". Charlie's long and eventful life and career in football management and administration over seven decades was indeed a wonderful record of which he was most justifiably proud. From his origins with a local Durham pit village team to the pinnacle of the game with the Football Association at national level, brought him success, and much deserved recognition at all levels for distinguished service.

SHIELDS 'GAZETTE' SPORTS WRITERS WE REMEMBER.

Bill Bawden, 1923 – 1985, he worked for the Northern Press for 46 years, and began work with the Shields 'Gazette' as a copy boy in 1937, and was for more than 30 years the sports editor. He began writing football reports for the Shields Wednesday League and eventually moved to the sports desk. He was a founder member of the Sports Council in South Shields and an originator of the borough's annual Sports Week, and in the year of his death became the recipient of the Vaux special award for outstanding service to sports reporting. After service in the RAF during the Second World War, he became sports editor., until he retired in 1983. He was president of the South Shields Sunday Football League. Recognised as a distinguished journalist, who made a remarkable contribution to the sporting life of our town, he is well remembered as a great friend of SSFC.

Dick Kirkup, 1932 – 1986,after working for the Northern Press on the north side of the River Tyne for some years, he joined the Shields Gazette in 1961 and succeeded Bill Bawden as sports editor in 1983. A founding member of the North East Branch of the Football Writer's Association, other close interest were boxing, darts and cricket. He had a great knowledge of the local sports scene, as well as national and international sports. A 1986 newspaper comment said that he was 'gold' to an evening newspaper. He wrote authoritively and with style, and had flair for layout, presenting sporting news and pictures attractively. He was very popular with South Shields FC players and like his long term colleague Bill Bawden was a great friend of the club and his articles over the years were always an excellent account of match reports or club topical matters of interest. He made a valuable contribution to local sport over a quarter of a century, and

had a host of friends involved in all local sports activities, and was also a valued member of the BBC Radio Newcastle's sports team.
